Energy healing, <u>26</u>, is becoming a mainstream concept. In healing, people often refer to channeling "chi" or "universal energy" to help people clear energetic blocks. Many people associate this practice with Reiki, a system of natural healing that uses universal energy and the laying of hands to help people alleviate spiritual, physical or mental suffering. <u>27</u>, ranging from shamanism to Chinese and ayurveda medicine. Part A

Jonathan Harris is an artist, computer scientist, and storyteller working primarily on the Internet. His online art work involves the exploration and understanding of humans, captures the world's expression on a global scale, and gives us a glimpse of the soul of the Internet. His projects are both intensely personal and entirely global, and they share the same effect— to show off a world that resonates with shared emotions, concerns, problems, triumphs and troubles.

In one of his recent projects about happiness, he interviewed a lot of local people in Bhutan. He asked people a number of set questions and took a number of set photographs, starting by asking people to rate their happiness between one and 10, and then when they answered, he would inflate that number of balloons and give them that number of balloons to hold. So, some really happy persons were holding 10 balloons, and some really sad soul holding one balloon. But even holding one balloon is like, kind of happy. And then he would ask them a number of questions like when the happiest day in their life is, what makes them happy. And then finally, he would ask them to make a wish and write their wish onto one of the balloons and take a picture of them holding it. The last thing he did was take all those wish balloons — there were 117 interviews, 117 wishes — up to a place called Dochula, which is a mountain pass in Bhutan, at 10,300 feet, one of the more sacred places in Bhutan. And up there, there are thousands of prayer flags that people have spread out over the years. And he re-inflated all of the balloons, put them up on a string, and hung them up there among the prayer flags.

A Gruesome Murder:

The Shihlin District Prosecutors' Office on Monday recommended the death penalty for the suspect in the gruesome killing of a 4-year-old girl, nicknamed "Little Light Bulb," in late March, in Neihu District, Taipei.

On March 28 at 11 a.m., "Little Light Bulb," surnamed Liu, in the company of her mother, was riding a strider bike toward MRT station to meet her grandfather and two of her siblings for lunch. When she had trouble getting her bike onto the sidewalk, a man grabbed her from behind, and using a cleaver, decapitated her. The sudden attack shocked her mother, who thought the man was approaching her daughter to help pick up the bicycle. The mother screamed for help and passersby rushed over to subdue the suspect, but it was too late. The child already died. This was the second child killed in Taipei in less than a year, inflaming widespread public anger, as well as a debate about capital punishment. The death penalty is legal under Taiwan's criminal code, but death sentences were not enforced for a five-year period from 2006 to 2010, until public outcry over the lack of enforcement pressured the Kuomintang government to resume executions. After the broad-daylight slain, a legislator proposed a bill that would require a death penalty sentence for anyone convicted of killing children under 12. But the girl's mother, who spoke to reporters after the killing, urged the public not to turn her daughter's death into a debate about the death penalty. "If you are concerned about us or have sympathy, please respect us," the mother said, "I don't wish to see such discussions at the time being."




Part F


It's each gamer's duty to know how much they are playing and to make sure that they are not hurting the people around them and their real life by playing games.


